THE CONTEXT:

The urgent crises of climate change, ecological destruction and COVID-19 have cast light on many failings of mainstream economic and social thinking and practice.

There is growing interest in more holistic understandings of economy, such as doughnut economics, which embed business and economic life within ecological limits and human needs.


There is a need for an urgent transition to a *new paradigm* which embeds economic practice within a broader framework of shared values.

There are already significant praxis networks supporting sustainable finance, regenerative economics, social entrepreneurship, economy for the common good – to mention a few.

How can these movements move mainstream? As these globalised chains have been damaged due to COVID-19 — and people are actively asking what the 'new normal' looks like - there is a new opportunity to see something new emerge.

Global greenhouse gas emissions scenarios

Potential future emissions pathways of global greenhouse gas emissions (measured in gigatonnes of carbon dioxide equivalents) in the case of no climate policies, current implemented policies, national pledges within the Paris Agreement, and 2°C and 1.5°C consistent pathways. High, median and low pathways represent ranges for a given scenario. Temperature figures represent the estimated average global temperature increase from pre-industrial, by 2100.

Faith, Mission and Money

In the face of the current crises, there is evidence of a growing momentum to see increased alignment of mission and money.


Putting Laudato Sí into Practice

Who will green the Church?

There is a growing need to generate new *green social enterprises* specifically geared at supporting the Church with its ambitious Seven-Year Plan to implement Laudato Si' and to grasp the opportunity of the post-COVID recovery.

Implementing Laudato Si' involves changes right across the 2,866 dioceses, 1,500+ Catholic third level institutions, 221,700 parishes – not to mention the 1.3 billion people who profess to be Catholics.

This requires a continuing ecological conversion and continued environmental formation that provides the basis for upskilling of Catholic communities to understand Laudato Si' and start to put it into practice, also within the business world.
